

Points from the pulpit

"I am the resurrection and the Life" John 11 verse 25.

Since the March issue of our Church magazine 'FOCUS', Easter has come and gone. Now we are looking forward to the summer and the good weather!

For many the religious significance of Christ's resurrection means little or nothing, but I feel that for us here within the family of Christ's people in Whitehead Congregational Church, must ask ourselves seriously the question,

"What does the message of Easter mean to me, personally?" obviously such a question cannot be answered in a word or in a thousand words. However to guide us in our thinking, as your friend and minister, in seeking to make reply I would suggest firstly,

The cross means light – light for our minds.

So often the experiences of daily life bring discouragement on every hand. In nature there is a constant delay, disintegration, death, as the poet puts it, "nature red in tooth and claw". Along our earthly pilgrimage we come face to face with sorrow, suffering, tragedy, heartache and heartbreak. A loved one dies of cancer, a splendid.

A young man with a brilliant career, in front of him, paralysed for life in an accident on the rugby field. The innocent child of a most loyal and devoted church family is killed in a car crash. Our minds are confused and bewildered by happenings such as these. In our distraught souls, amid the agony of our hearts we cry out for an explanation. Only the echo of our unanswered cries return to us all the reasoning, all our inquiring leaves us seemly in darkness. Is there no light for our minds?

It is here at the very point that out of that impenetrable blackness there comes the message of the cross. Here at last is light for our minds. At Calvary's cross we see the heart of God laid bare, and that the heart reveals itself as the heart of all embracing love through self sacrifice. All is not sorrow, all is not suffering, all is not death.

Calvary is not defeat but victory. Christ's God's only begotten Son, has brought light out of darkness.

An old highland fisherman was reading aloud the fifteenth chapter of Mark's Gospel making the words live with the emotion in his voice, "Save thyself"; he read, "And come down from the cross."

"But o man of my heart", he cried, "You didn't come down, you were too good of a soldier for that. You fought it out to the last."

There was a man who saw the light from the victorious cross. For the self-sacrifice of the Saviour leads us to the light of his resurrection victory. He had changed the blackness of Calvary into the brightness of the resurrection morning-

Therefore let us pray

In the cross of Christ I glory, Towering o'er the wrecks of time All the light of sacred story Gathers round its head sublime.

Secondly I would suggest

The cross means love – love of our hearts

Jesus bridged the gap between Heaven and Earth. He brought God down to us and made us know God as our loving heavenly Father.

Nothing so vividly reveals the love of God for us as Jesus sacrificial

death upon the cross.

As we stand looking in the Saviour's eyes as he dies, we understand from that moment that his death is not only for the multitude of men, women and young people, but for each one of us personally. The cross shows us the extent of that love, the height of it, the depth of it, the width of it, it is intensely personal. Yet it is more than personal. It is transforming, redeeming.

In the novel, 'Children of the ghetto', the lovely Jewess, Rebecca, is tempted to forsake the path of right.

Her lover promises comfort and luxury, and a thousand dazzling pleasures. She resolves to run away with him. Her cases are packed, the house is silent. The taxi is waiting at the front door,

Suddenly a light engulfed her. She sees her father's face uplifted in love and earnest prayer, and then she gives her final decision –

"I may not go", she cried to her lover. "I dare not go, I will not go. Good-bye."

When we look into the face of Christ our hearts are touched by that forgiving redeeming love of our Saviour and friend.

In this space age with scientists probing deeper and deeper into the vastness of the universe, we all at times ask ourselves, are we just a dot, a cosmic speck of dust hurling through space without purpose, without meaning? My friends, the cross of Christ says otherwise. The all embracing love of God enters our lives personally as we stand by that central cross, accepting Christ in faith. This love of God is ours for ever and ever. It is a redeeming love with power to forgive and lift us above our sinful natures. We do not understand all that happened at the cross, but we do know that Christ's cross has brought God's personal forgiving and redeeming love to us.

Calvary is not defeat but victory. Christ's God's only begotten Son has brought love out of despair. Let us each one yield ourselves to that love.

> I know not how that Calvary's cross A world from sin could free I only know its matchless love Has brought god's love to me.

The cross means life – life for our souls.

I cling to the cross as a drowning man clasps a life-belt. For if the cross of Christ is taken out of my life – your life, my life – all our lives would sink into nothingness. When the road is rocky and rough and things go wrong, I must anchor myself to this cross for it is the symbol of new life, of renewed life, abundant life for you and me, for us all.

If we lose our grip upon the cross of Christ, we lose our grip upon that way of life which is the only real and living way for true life. – for the cross means the beginning of life eternal here and now.

From the second world war comes the dramatic incident when an American warship has been torpedoed by the Japanese. The torpedo had penetrated the side of the ship but failed to explode, it had to be made harmless. Two young ratings crawled in beside that deadly piece of evil. Piece by piece they remove the steel plating around the warhead of the torpedo, revealing the deadly mechanism. Once, twice, they attempt to remove it but each time it slips back.

A third time they tried and with great calmness and courage, as one of them raised the exploding device, the other in a flash inserted a paper card, jamming the needle, leaving the torpedo harmless, its sting drawn.

My friends we are all aware that part of life is death –physical death, but the sting of death is drawn – the cross of Christ has seen to that.

"O death where is thy sting, O grave were is thy victory? Thanks be to God who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ"

We are inheritors of the everlasting. The message of the victorious cross ensures us that all we are in possession of that quality of life which will never end. Because Jesus lives we too shall live for ever and ever. Calvary is not defeat but victory. Christ's God's only begotten Son, has brought life out of death.

Therefore in the joy of all the light and love and life revealed by the cross of Christ to our minds and hearts and souls, let us daily strive to serve our saviour, praying as we do so,

Annual General Meeting

The AGM took place on Tuesday 30th March 2010 at 7.45pm. There were 31 persons present.

After welcoming the members Dr. Ryan opened the meeting with prayer and hymn 249 "We love the place O God".

Dr. Ryan took as his theme 'The way ahead' and the passage of scripture from Joshua Ch 1 verses 1-9.

He referred to a recent television documentary 'Season Ticket' recalling the life story of Dr. Jack Kyle – the famous Irish rugby international player.

Jack Kyle after qualifying as a medical doctor went to Africa for two years and stayed there all his working life. He became a brilliant and devoted surgeon and a friend to the people and was greatly loved by the whole community Reviewing his life experiences he said that life had taught him –

- To be grateful for the past
- To be enthusiastic for the present
- To be confident for the future

Fellow members of Whitehead Congregational Church: -

As we review the worship, work and witness of our congregation this evening let Dr. Kyle's words inspire us to be grateful for the dedication and commitment and sacrifice of those who have gone before us, to be enthusiastic for the opportunities and challenges that all confronting us in the life of our congregation at this present time, to be confident as we look forward to the days ahead and in the words of God to his servant Joshua "Let us be strong and of good courage; to be afraid neither be Thou dismayed – for the Lord Thy God is with Thee whithersoever Thou goest"

It was then time for the reports and the first was from the Church Secretary who said-

Good evening Ladies and Gentlemen

It was at our last AGM we decided to replace the slates of the Church roof and this is now completed at a cost of £31913.35. To keep costs down and with the advice from the contractor it was decided to only replace the left hand side of the roof with new slates and reuse the right hand side with the original slates. Also to insulate the roof between the slates and the wooden sarking to help keep the heat escaping through the roof and also to comply with current building regulations. We have had a few problems but we are hopeful that these have now been resolved although there seems to be a lot of flaking recently from the walls but I think this is due to the walls drying out. With this in mind we will take a few moisture readings and again with your approval, repaint the walls of the church?

We still not replaced the kitchen which was another of our most expensive projects and it looks like that we wont well not for the next year or two as it is not a priority. Although the kitchen has been brought to our attention by Carrick Council who have notified us that due to proposals that they have brought out we are not allowed to prepare any food in the kitchen until the appropriate people have been trained and the kitchen has been inspected.

We are in the throws of doing that with the help of Irene and we will keep you informed of any developments. I would like to draw to your attention in Ernest's report under the utilities. You may have noticed the reduction in the Electric and fuel bills. Taken in account we got a rebate due to the fact that we had been using less electricity that last year as they estimated readings on the previous year we can assume that this is due to the new heating system and the replacement of the ceiling especially in the church hall and not due to me turning the heating down to save money. At this rate we will get a payback return in the next few years for the work that we carried out.

All this work costs money and although we do have some money in the kitty it has taken a good knock lately and we are indebted to those of you that have helped out through the building fund and we thank you, but especially to the anonymous person who donated £5000 we thank you. Also to the people who carryout work for the church, Mr Andrew Cluney who carried out the pat testing, Bob Hermin who tidies up the flowerbeds and supplies us with plants, Mrs Rosemary Keyes and her daughter for making Christmas Cards and raised £70 and just recently to Cameron Moore who gave an excellent talk and film show on the wildlife around Co Antrim and has raised £78 with still orders coming in for the sale of his DVD (Its not to late to order a copy). These are just a few of the people I have had time to mention in this report we are indeed indebted to you for your financial assistance to our church.

This most important issue that I have to bring to this meeting is Ministerial duties. Rev Ryan has asked that he wishes to step down from being out 'Part Time' minister in 6 months time due to ill-health and family pressures. As you know Rev Ryan was approached by John Thompson 16 years ago to take a few sermons and the rest is history. This is probably not the right time to express the gratitude that we owe to him for the way he has helped Whitehead Congregational over those years, we will do that at a later date, but he will surely be missed when he leaves us and I cant thank him enough for the why he has helped, guided and steered me over the past years both spiritually and personally again thank-you. I mentioned it at our last AGM and although it was suggested that we should maybe merge with Larne Congregational it was felt that this may lead to confliction. How could a minister be dedicated to the needs of one church without affecting the other?

Services would have to be altered to suit, we would have no control over the minister and our way of praise is different to Larne's and this surely would have an effect of this churches longstanding traditions. And then there is the financial element, How much do we pay for a minister now. When it was suggested at a committee meeting a few years back the outgoing minister of Straid asked for £30,000 a year and a new suit. We don't have a manse how many families does Larne have, could he cope? It takes Rev. Ryan a year to complete his Pastoral duties for us. How do you divide the share of his wage. We financially can't afford a full time minister. Rev. Ryan is doing his best in looking out for someone who he think maybe suitable for us be as he will tell you there are over 40 vacancies in the Presbyterian church although there are Methodist and Church of Ireland ministers who also retire but we have not explored these area's. If you read the last issue of the Congregationalist you will have notice that over half of the items in the magazine are from churches that are also have vacant pulpits. I believe that there are presently 8 vacancies in the Congregational Church and all are hoping for someone to arrive at there church one day to take over?

The committee is at a dilemma do we wait until Rev. Ryan finds us someone suitable, do we advertise and hope we also find someone who is suitable but is will to work for a small fee, wage. Or are we happy to do what the other churches do and invite ministers or pastors to take our Sunday worship for the foreseeable future, bearing in mind that we need an ordained minister to take communion. Who will attend our sick at home and at hospital and who is going to officiate at funerals? Again we will keep you informed each month of the committee's progress. And talking of committees, Renée Ginn resigned from the committee this year due to ill health and we welcome two new members, Brenda Wilson and Roy Lennox to help us with our duties.

Finally I would like to thank those who have helped me out over the past year. I would like to let you know the silent workers who help organise events as they arise and keep the church clean and help run the church and I say them in no particular order. Robert Hermin, June Hawkins, Mrs Ryan, Julie Clugston, Ruth McCleary and members of the committee, the Choir, those who clean the church each week, Jean and Eileen on flower duty and those who gift flowers each week. To Brenda, Elizabeth, Cara and Joanne at the Sunday school.

To Ernie and the Rev Ryan and lastly to you for attending this AGM and supporting the Church each week by your attendance as well as financially and I sincerely apologise if I left anyone out and hope I have not offended anyone.

I now commend this Secretary's report to this AGM. Thank you.
